While several large collaborative network programs exist, often sharing many of the same partners (e.g., federal agencies; tribal nations; state and local governments; academic institutions; nongovernmental organizations), regular coordination among these programs is often limited or presents challenges. The CESU Network is tasked 'to conduct collaborative and interdisciplinary applied projects that address natural and cultural heritage resource issues at multiple scales and in an ecosystem context.' Many agencies and organizations support efforts to develop and implement regional, watershed, landscape or ecosystem conservation projects that address interactions between spatial patterns and ecological and cultural processes. This session will explore an effort to develop an inter-unit CESU consortium focused on the Mississippi River Watershed. Representatives from different CESUs will share lessons from regional efforts, provide an overview of ideas developed during a scoping meeting for the proposed Great Lakes, Rivers, and Gulf inter-unit consortium (link to proceedings), and invite participants to discuss the potential next steps and explore how to best position CESUs to add value to regional science, stewardship, governance, and policy activities.
